

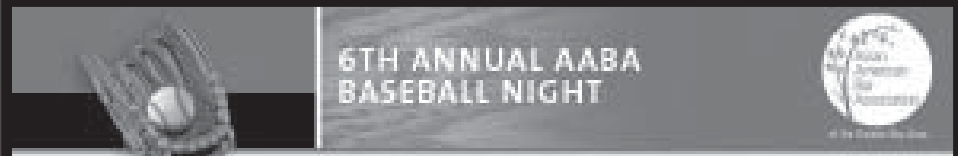

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David Chiu installed as New President of AABA

David Chiu has never forgotten how he became more interested in being an Asian American and political activist. He recalled an incident after he started college, which changed him. "An Asian American girl walked up to me and said 'David Chiu you are a banana,'" said Chiu, who received his undergraduate, graduate and law degrees from Harvard University. He explained that a banana is someone who is yellow on the outside and white on the inside. "This made me realize I needed to learn more about being Asian American. That started me on my path to become a political activist."

On February 24 Chiu became the new president of the Asian American Bar Association of the Greater Bay Area. More than 700 people attended the 29th Annual installation dinner at the Far East Café in San Francisco. AABA is the largest Asian American bar association and one of the largest minority bar associations in the country.

Chiu has worked in all three branches of government, was voted one of the best lawyers under 40 by the National Asian American Pacific Bar Association and currently serves as president of San Francisco's District 3 Democratic Club. He is now the chief operating officer and co-founder of Grassroots Enterprises, a public affairs firm that provides technology and online strategy to nonprofits, political and trade organizations.

Former Alameda County Superior Court Judge Ken Kawaichi presided over the swearing in ceremony for Chiu and his officers and board. Edwin Prather serves as vice-president, Celia Lee as treasurer and Garner Weng as secretary. The board members are S. Iasbel Choi, Emi Gusukuma, Malcolm Yeung, Christine K. Noma, Willie Nguyen, Eugene Pak, Billy Chan and Yu-Yee Wu.

The mistress of ceremonies was Sydnie Kohara, CBS 5 Eyewitness News Early Edition anchorwoman.

Retired San Francisco Superior Court Judge Lillian Sing (who is running for superior court judge) and San Francisco Superior Court Judge Julie Tang made judicial acknowledgments.

Kathy Asada, last year's AABA president who works in the San Francisco Public Defender's Office presided over AABA's Service and Diversity Awards. The 2006 AABA Service Award was presented to Jason Lee of Leibert Cassidy Whitmore and the 2006 AABA Commitment to Diversity Award to Hanson Bridgett Marcus Vlahos & Rudy LLP with Weng accepting for his firm.

San Mateo County Superior Court Judge Elizabeth Lee and Eumi Lee from Hastings College of the Law presented the 2006 AABA Law Foundation Scholarships. Bob Kao from Boalt and Victoria Zhou from Hastings received the Law Foundation Scholarships, Bryant



Yang from Boalt received the Joe Morizumi Scholarship and Doan Nguyen from Boalt received the Ray Ocompo Jr. AABA President's Scholarship.

Edwin Prather, last year's recipient of the Morizumi award, presented Christopher Ho, from Legal Aid Society, Employment Law Center, with the 2006 Joe Morizumi Lifetime Achievement Award for Exceptional Legal Advocacy.

A representative from California Assemblyman Mark Leno's office had a proclamation honoring Chiu for becoming the new AABA president. Chiu also recognized and thanked Asada for her work as the outgoing AABA president and everyone who helped make the organization successful.

In his president's address, Chiu not only recognized his parents for their encouragement and supported

his endeavors. He reflected briefly on his past in the law and in advocacy and more about AABA. Chiu is proud that AABA worked to see more Asian Americans appointed to the judiciary, supported same sex marriage and helped elected Jeff Adachi to become The City's public defender, Kamala Harris as the district attorney and Phil Ting as the assessor/recorder.

Chiu said AABA offers many benefits to its members and including a successful mentoring program. He paid tribute to all the committee chairs, volunteers and supporters of AABA and said the organization also knows how to "have fun."

The keynote speaker was Captain James Yee, the former US Muslim Chaplain at Guantanamo Bay, who was falsely accused of spying, espionage and helping the Taliban and Al-Qaeda prisoners. He spoke about coming from a military family, where he was one of two sons who graduated from West

Point, how he converted to Islam, serving in the military and his experience at Guantanamo Bay. Despite being recognized for his work in the Army, Yee has to endure great suffering when falsely accused of his crimes. After he received an honorable discharge last January, Yee was awarded a second Army commendation medal for his "exceptional meritorious service."

Yee, who is now studying for a graduate degree in international relations, stressed the importance of lawyers only doing their jobs well, but fighting to protect people's civil liberties. He has written a book about his life and struggles titled "For God and Country: Faith and Patriotism Under Fire."

After closing remarks by Kohara, an after party was held at The Bubble Lounge in San Francisco.

Haratani Named BASF's First Asian American Woman President

She never aspired for fame or fortune, but attorney Joan Haratani has become the first woman of color to leave the Bar Association of San Francisco (BASF).

In the association's 133 year history, Haratani is also only the second Asian American president, following Michael Lee.

Haratani, a partner at Morgan Lewis & Bockius in San Francisco where she specializes in mass torts, product liability and commercial transactions, is the former AABA president and regional governor for the National Asian Pacific Bar Association. She served on the BASF board for four years before becoming president and is proud to break the mold where mostly Caucasian men have ruled.

"Asian women are not taught to be leaders," said Haratani, who was asked by community leaders to consider becoming BASF president. "But, today you see more women who are not content to lead lives like their mothers who were often homemakers. Many women work and have families."

In her acceptance speech after being sworn into her new position, Haratani said her "first presidential initiative will be to implement the Diversity Best practices" which will "expand the definition of diversity so that it includes the gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender community, so that it includes those with disabilities, so that it includes working parents."

Her second initiative will be The Working Parents Task Force, which will "create a list of Best Practices.: Law firms and law departments will be asked to support the Working Parents Initiative. Haratani said many of her female lawyer friends left the legal profession due to family obligations.

"This is not an easy profession to work in," said Haratani, who works 12-15 hours with four hours a day on BASF work.

Although Haratani does not have children, she hopes changes can be made so more attorneys can contribute their talents to the legal profession. The working Parents Task Force will not only examine the economic and brain drain for the law firms, but the decrease of women

working in the profession when flexible working hours are not allowed.



Haratani also feels strongly about helping the homeless and said her association will "host a web page that tells stories about clients of the Homeless Advocacy Project, part of VLSP. It's very difficult to get out of homelessness, so we will also focus on those who are at risk, or transitioning out of homelessness.

Establishing sister city bar associations with groups in Asia is also important to Haratani. Connections have already been made with bar associations in Shanghai, Hong Kong, and Beijing. This would not only give practical assistance to lawyers who have offices in Asia, she says, but also created goodwill between those working here and abroad.

Haratani, who has volunteered for one of Mayor Gavin Newsom's homeless projects, said doing pro bono work is important for lawyers because "they have the opportunity to help many people including people less fortunate than themselves ... The Bar Association of San Francisco has been a leader in the pro bono area especially trying to help the homeless."

Haratani, a sansei, remembers growing up in East Palo Alto and losing her father to leukemia at 22. Her family's internment camp experiences have made a great impact on her desire to see people's civil rights upheld. Haratani acknowledged how the legal profession has changed since she began 22 years ago when she could count the number of Asian American women attorneys on her fingers.

A graduate of St. John's University and University of California, Davis School of Law, Haratani has come a long way. Among her honors are being selected as a Super Lawyer of Northern California in 2004 and 2005 and recognized by the Daily Journal as one of the "Top 75 Women Litigators." California Law Business named her as one of "California's Top Rainmakers" in 1996, 1997, 1999 and 2001. She also serves on the boards of the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society of Northern California.

With so much on her plate, how does Haratani relieve stress?

WHAT'S THE PURPOSE?

To provide attorneys of all levels and practice areas an individualized support system to address issues unique to practicing attorneys who may not have an existing mentor in their own firm or organization, or desire an additional AABA mentor.

HOW DOES IT WORK?

It's simple. Mentees with roughly 0-2 years of experience will be matched with a senior-level attorney (those with approximately 4+ years of experience) who will serve as their Mentor. Mentees with roughly 3+ years of experience will be matched with a partner-level Mentor. Every attempt will be made to match a Mentee with a Mentor in his or her practice or interest area.

Also, there will be a pool of senior-level attorneys and partners who will be available to address specific questions on an ad-hoc basis.

WHAT'S THE TIME COMMITMENT?

We kindly ask that those who serve as Mentors make a best effort at contacting their Mentees a minimum of once a quarter to check in on how their Mentees are doing (i.e. informal phone call, email, lunch, etc.).

If you would like to be a Mentor but simply do not have the time, we encourage you to participate by answering questions for Mentees on an ad-hoc basis. Please contact Reichi Lee (reichilee@gmail.com) or Isabel Choi (sichoi@usfca.edu) for more information on this option.

WHAT DO WE TALK ABOUT?

It will depend on the specific needs of each Mentee. Topics of discussion may include: professional/business development, network strategies, substantive areas of law, partnership track issues, success at a firm during junior years, and career transitions.

"Exercise is very important for me," she said. "I feel much better when I can exercise."

Haratani has competed in marathons and Ironman competitions. She began running marathons after a former colleague wanted to compete in a marathon because she needed to lose weight, but also to raise money so she could help people with leukemia.

"I felt if my co-worker could compete in a marathon, so could I," said Haratani. "But I also felt the importance of doing something to help with leukemia since my father had died from that."

"There's only one litigator in the family," said Haratani, who speaks proudly about her husband, Ralph Latza, a former public defender in Contra Costa County who now works as a certified financial planner for Merrill Lynch.

Haratani said she "believes in Karma" and "what goes around comes around." She felt the Chinese sayings her friend Grace Tsukiyama, the mother of authoress Gail Tsukiyama, told her have made a great impact.

"It's important to value the sayings your parents or elders tell us because they have much meaning," said Haratani.

APILO Immigration 101 Training

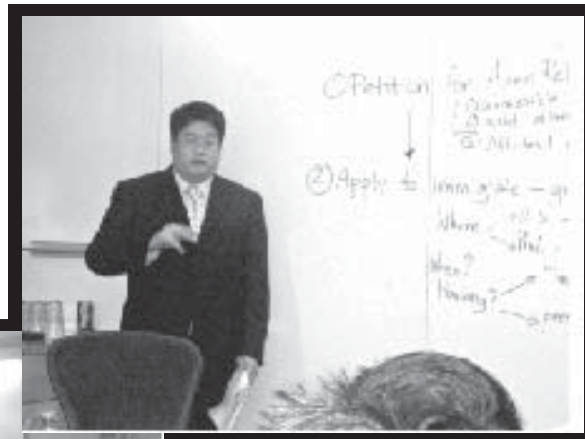


At full capacity, more than thirty people attended each of AABA/Asian Pacific Islander Legal Outreach's (APILO) two "Immigration 101" trainings, hosted and sponsored by Fenwick & West. APILO staff attorneys Kevin Pimentel and Laureen Laglagaron conducted the two-hour trainings for attorneys, law students, and other interested participants. The training provided basic information on a broad number of immigration areas including the history of immigration law, governmental structure of immigration agencies, family petitions, Child Status Protection Act, citizenship, and other types of immigration relief.

What made the program unique was its focus on the Filipino community. The impact of immigration laws on the Filipino community and the choices many must make, were made evident

through several hypothetical situations (based on real client circumstances) that were played out by audience participants. Abstract laws and procedures were made concrete and real, through their application to immigrant families. With the explosion of public discourse on immigration issues in this country, this training was both timely and significant.

Pimentel and Laglagaron closed the session with an appeal to educating ourselves, and giving back to the community through volunteering at the various AABA legal clinics.
